THE GEOLOGICAL SURVEY OF ETHIOPIA*



The Geological Survey of Ethiopia was set up in November 1968 under the Ministry of Mines. The technical functions and general policies of the Geological Survey was "to survey and map geologically the whole of the Empire and to undertake exploration and to publish regional geological maps and reports; maps and reports on detailed investigations of mineral occurrences". Geological maps like topographic maps, have multiple uses. Not only do they form the basis for geological mapping, but they are necessary in building and construction and for the use of agronomists, foresters, urban planners, conservationists and other specialists concerned with environmental control. With this object in mind a start was made by the Ministry to set up a Cartographic Section.

Prior to 1968: the Section was run by five draftsmen who were only undertaking routine tracing jobs, equipment was limited, both in modern equipment and drafting materials. The draftsmen were given some basic training in elementary cartography and photogrammetry at the Mapping and Geography Institute. No proper record of maps or filing system existed, but some large volume of work was done.

Creation of the geological survey in November 1960. Through the United States Agency for International Development a Cartographer from the United States Geological Survey was seconded in December 1968 for a period of 18 months to set up a Cartographic Section together with the appointment of an experienced Chief Cartographer by the Ministry of Mines in early February 1969. The task for these two was formidable. Through the aid of the United Nations Development Programme in Ethiopia (United Nations Mineral Survey in Two Selected Areas) with equipment and modern materials donated by the United States
