Key recommendations of sessions of the Regional Coordination Mechanism for Africa (2006-2017)

Background

The last session of Regional Coordination Mechanism for Africa (RCM-Africa) which was held in Dakar on 25 and 26 March 2017, marked the eighteenth successive occasion where agencies and organizations of the United Nations system had held consultations with key African institutions on strengthening coherence and ensuring a more coordinated delivery of United Nations support for development in Africa. The theme for the meeting was “UN System Support to Harnessing Demographic Dividend through investments in the Youth.” The Session, jointly organized by the Secretariats of the RCM-Africa and the regional United Nations Development Group for (R-UNDG), marked an historic first meeting of the R-UNDG and the RCM-Africa. UNFPA and UNESCO sponsored youth delegates/ and speakers to the meeting making it a truly youth focused meeting.

The purpose of the annual meetings is to promote synergy and coordination among the agencies and organizations of the United Nations system, with a view to improving their collective response to meeting the priority needs of the continent and in their delivery of support to African Union organizations, for greater effectiveness and impact. RCM-Africa aims to achieve this by stepping up the joint programming and implementation of activities, operationalized through a cluster system. Another key objective of RCM-Africa is to improve cooperation and collaboration between agencies of the United Nations system and African continental organizations, such as the African Union Commission, the New Economic Partnership for Africa’s Development (NEPAD) Agency, regional economic communities, and the African Development Bank.

RCM-Africa has convened 18 annual meetings since 1999, however, it was only after the seventh such meeting that the Mechanism gained momentum in strengthening partnerships between organizations of the United Nations system and African regional and subregional organizations. A number of recommendations to that end were put forward by RCM-Africa during the consecutive annual meetings between 2006 and 2016. The secretariat of RCM-Africa, which was set in place to coordinate United Nations support to the African Union and its NEPAD programme

– pursuant to the recommendation of RCM-Africa at its tenth session in November 2009, is jointly operationalized by ECA and the African Union Commission – has been particularly diligent in ensuring follow-up to the implementation of RCM-Africa recommendations.

For the record, RCM-Africa has, to date, held the following sessions:

The thematic clusters evolved from four to five, then expanded to seven and eventually nine by 2016, with associated subclusters. The nine clusters were: infrastructure development cluster; governance; social and human development; environment, population and urbanization; agriculture, food security and rural development; science and technology; advocacy and communication; peace and security; and industry, trade and market access. The seventeenth session adopted eight new clusters in alignment with the African Union’s Agenda 2063 and its first ten-year implementation plan, and the Sustainable Development Goals. The eighteenth session added a ninth cluster to be Peace and Security to allow a platform for AU Peace Architecture to report as part of the RCM. Altogether the clusters are:

- (a) Sustainable and inclusive economic growth, industry, trade agriculture and agro-processing and regional integration
- (b) Infrastructure development
- (c) Human capital development, health, nutrition, science, technology and innovation
- (d) Labour, employment creation, social protection, migration and mobility
- (e) Gender equality, women and youth empowerment
- (f) Humanitarian matters and disaster risk management
- (g) Environment, urbanization and population
- (h) Advocacy, information, communications and culture.
- (i) Peace and security.

The RCM-Africa secretariat has prepared the present compilation, recording the recommendations and priorities the mechanism identified at the successive sessions, from the seventh to the seventeenth, and indicating the extent to which the recommendations have been implemented, with the purpose of assisting clusters and subclusters with the implementation.
