

#### EDITOR'S NOTE

This is likely to be the last issue of this newsletter. First published in March 1971, the African Census Programme newsletter has been the principal source of information on the status of the programme for many people in the region and outside it. Periodic reports on the status of the census projects in a number of African countries have been presented as well as up-to-date news on the assignment of UN country experts. The readership of the newsletter has covered persons in the United Nations system who need to familiarize themselves with the ACP as well as government officials and demographers and statisticians in and outside Africa.

The decision to discontinue the newsletter is being taken in view of the fact that the African Census Programme in its present form comes to an end on 31 December 1977. However, its work is expected to be continued by a team of regional advisers attached to the Statistics Division of ECA. News on African censuses and demographic surveys will be contained in the Statistical Newsletter, which is issued periodically by the Statistics Division.

We wish to take this opportunity to thank all our readers for their continued support during the period when the newsletter was published. We hope that the service that we have rendered for the past few years will continue to be rendered by the Statistical Newsletter.

### A. EGYPT

The Arab Republic of Egypt conducted a census of its population in November 1976. This was the eighth population census to be taken since the beginning of the century, and was the third of a modern census series in the country.

The census data collected is being processed. The preliminary census results have since been released. According to these results, the resident population of the country on the date of enumeration was 38,228,180 and the population present on that date was 36,656,180. Thus the annual rate of the population growth during the intercensal period 1966-1976 was 2.31% as compared to 2.54% in the previous period.

30,000 enumerators, 6,000 controllers and 4,000 delegués communaux were employed in the census operation. A post-enumeration survey based on approximately 250 enumeration districts (or 1 per cent of the estimated total population of 17 million) had been planned for about the middle of March 1977, to check coverage and to enable the Statistics Office to indicate the degree of reliability which should be attached to the census figure.

The Government Statistical Office is now busy with the processing of the census data. The provisional census results are expected to be out shortly.

#### II. MAURITANIA COMPLETES CENSUS FIELD ENUMERATION

The Islamic Republic of Mauritania which started the enumeration of both its sedentary and nomadic populations in December 1976, was able to complete this enumeration by the end of April 1977.

The Mauritanian Government has announced the preliminary results of the Census as follows:

The estimate of the nomadic population is based on the list of collectivities and not the result of the sample survey conducted as part of the Census. The provisional population of Nouakehott, the Capital of Mauritania, is 134,986. The 96,080 non-resident nomads are transhumants between Mauritania and its neighbours, mainly Mali.

The Government Statistical Office is now busy with processing of the data collected in the census enumeration.

#### VI. WORLD FERTILITY SURVEY

The Governing Council of the United Nations Fund for Population Activities (UNFPA), at its plenary meeting on 1 February 1977 approved the World Fertility Survey Programme for a further period of five years. The World Fertility Survey Programme initiated in 1972 had completed its first five year programme by mid-1977.

It may be recalled that the World Fertility Survey (WFS) is an international population research programme being carried out by the International Statistical Institute (ISI) in co-operation with the International Union for the Scientific Study of Population (IUSSP). The funds for the programme are supplied mainly by the UNFPA. Liaison officers for the WFS programme are located in the United Nations Headquarters, New York, and at the Economic Commissions for Latin America (ECLA) and Asia and the Pacific (ESCAP). For the Africa region liaison work in connection with the programme is done by the staff of the African Census Programme.

It may be recalled that the main objectives of the MFS are:

- (a) To assist individual countries, to acquire scientific information for ascertaining and interpreting their fertility levels;
- (b) To improve the local expertise and capacity for demographic research in the developing countries; and
- (c) To provide internationally comparable data.

So far, pilot surveys have been done in Zaire and Ghana, and plans for actual surveys are well advanced in Cameroon, Kenya and Lesotho. Plans have also been formulated for Ghana, Tunisia and Sudan. A number of African countries including Egypt, Ivory Coast, Senegal, Sierra Leone and Zambia have expressed interest in the programme.

#### VII. MICCIONC UNDERTAKEN BY ACP REGIONAL ADVICORY TEAM

Mr. K.T. de Graft-Johnson, Project Officer, undertook missions to Kenya (February) to assist the Kenya Statistical Office in revising their draft census project document and to make proposals on its plans for census followup activities; Somalia (February) to participate in a tripartite review of the 1975 Comalia census project. This joint mission by the Project Officer and Mr. L.A.M. Harding of the UN Statistical Office in New York resulted in revival of the census data processing which had been suspended for some time; Algeria (February/March) to accertain the progress made in the Algerian census project and also to discuss with the relevant authorities future plans; Tunicia (March) to evaluate the 1975 Tunician compute project; Ghana (March) to discuss the Nigeria Federal Capital City (ABUJA) Project with the Project Director in Accra; Nigeria (April) to assist the Nigerian Government in the organization of the demographic surveys which had been commissioned, and also to discuss with various organizations the World Fertility Survey Programme there; Ivory Coast (June) to participate in an evaluation and tripartite review meeting on the 1975 Ivory Coast population census project.

Mr. A.K. Laitra, Regional Campling Advicer, went on missions to Cameroon (January/February) to advise the Central Statistical Office on the census post-enumeration survey analysis, and to discuss the household survey programme; Algeria (May) to assist the Algerian Government in the post-enumeration survey programme in connection with the 1977 Census and also to advise the Statistical Office with respect to the household survey programmes; Sudan (May) to assist the Sudan Government Statistical Office in the programme of calculating the standard errors of the estimates obtained in the census (sample data), and also to advice them on the hourshold survey programme; Ivory Coast (June) to assist the CSO in drawing demographic cample curvey frame and to classify methodology for processing of 10% population census results. Also, to attend an evaluation and tripartite review meeting on the 1975 Ivory Coast population census project; Lali (June) to assist the government in planning of a demographic survey; Sudan (July) to assist the Sudan Government Department of Statistics in household surveys programme, and to participate in the First Statistics Conference of the Sudan held in Khartoum, Sudan, 25-28 July 1977

Mr. M.E.Ledjri, Regional Demographic Statistics Advicer, carried out miscions to Cape Verde (February) to assist the Government in the preparation of the census project assistance request for submission to the United Nations Fund for Population Activities (UNFPA); Mali (February/March) to assist the Mali Census Office in the conduct of the census and in the preparation of relevant documents; Gabon (May) to assist the Government in the preparation of project document for the population census of the country; Gao Tome & Principe (May) to assist the Government in starting preparatory work for the population census, which included the preparation of a revised time-table as well as formulating the draft of the necessary census legislation; Guinea (June) to review the census project document of Guinea, on the basis of the comments received from the UNFPA.

Mr. W. Raible, Regional Data Processing Adviser, visited <u>Cuaziland</u> (May-July) to assist the Census Office in processing the 1975 census data.

#### VIII. OTHER ILPORTANT ENGAGELENTS

The Project Officer, Mr. K.T. de Graft-Johnson attended the Experts' Committee Leeting on Co-ordination and Implementation of Inalysis of World Fertility Survey Data in London, U.K., 25-29 January 1977; and the Sub-Committee Leeting of the Organizing Committee for the 1977 International Union for the Scientific Study of Population (IUSSP) General Conference in Brussels, Belgium, 24-25 February 1977. He was also invited to deliver a series of lectures on the concepts, definitions and classifications relating to topics which should be included in household surveys in developing countries at the Centre for Advanced Training in Applied Statistics for Developing Countries, Lunich, Federal Republic of Germany, 14-19 Larch, 1977.

The Regional Sampling Adviser, Mr. A.K. Maitra gave a series of lectures on sampling techniques at the Institut de Formation Statistique (IFS), Yaoundé, Cameroon, 24 January - 5 February 1977.

### IX. VICITORS TO THE ACP REGIONAL HEADQUARTERS

Mr. B. Gil, who has been appointed as a short-term UN consultant to the Government of Laire to assist them in formulating a project on the forthcoming population census, visited the African Census Programme regional Office in Addis Ababa and the MCA Statistics Division on 5 and 7 June 1977 for consultations and briefing on his way to Kinshasa, Laire, to take up his new assignment. He also took this opportunity to look into the relevant files and documents available in the Office.

It may be recalled that prior to his present assignment, Mr. Gil served the United Nations for a good number of years in various capacities in the region.

Lir. K.M.A.Barnett, UN population densus expert attached to the population census project in Malawi, paid a visit to the ACP regional office in Addis Ababa on 20-24 June 1977 for consultations with the Project Officer and the subject-specialists on the regional staff.

It is sad to learn that hr. Barnett lost his dear wife recently. The ECA Statistics Division and the African Census Programme extend their condolences to him, his children, and to other bereaved relatives and friends.

#### M. STAFF NEWS

#### Arrivals

Mr. W. Raible (Federal Republic of Germany) joined the African Census Programme advisory team as the Regional Adviser on Data Processing in March 1977 at MCA Headquarters in Addic Ababa.

Lr. W. Joseph (Liberia), who was formerly UH general census expert in Cameroon, has been transferred to the Office of the Union Douanière et Economique de l'Afrique Centrale (UDEAC) as Chief of the Bureau Technique Regional in Bangui, Central African Empire, in January 1977.
