1. Introduction

1. The Statistics Division was invited by the Director of the Institute of Statistics and Applied Economics (ISAE) of Makerere University, Kampala, Uganda to participate in two meetings namely the Donors' Conference of ISAE which was scheduled to take place in Kampala from 25 to 26 April 1990 and the 14th Meeting of the Advisory Council of ISAE which was scheduled to take place immediately after the donors conference on 27 April 1990.

2. It should be recalled that the Donors' Conference was recommended by the 13th Advisory Council Meeting of the Institute which met in Harare, Zimbabwe on 28 November 1988. The objective of the Conference was to discuss ways of resolving problems which the institute is experiencing including those of fellowships for trainees, buildings for the Institute as well as other inputs. The Donors' Conference was recommended to be immediately followed by the 14th meeting of the Advisory Council.

II. The Donors' Conference

3. The Donors' Conference of ISAE took place at the Uganda International Conference Centre in Kampala from 25-26 April 1990. The Conference was opened by the First Deputy Prime Minister of the Government of Uganda. The programme of the Donors' Conference is attached as Annex I.

4. The Conference was attended by 77 participants. The participants from Uganda and other East and Southern African countries included those from the United Republic of Tanzania, Zambia, Zimbabwe, Malawi, Lesotho and Swaziland. The donors which were represented included those from Uganda and outside Uganda. Some of the outside donors which came or were represented included the following: Commonwealth Fund for Technical Co-operation (CFTC), UNDP, UNFPA, World Bank, World Vision International, Australian High Commission (Nairobi), USAID, French Embassy (Kampala), EEC (Kampala), Egyptian Embassy (Kampala). The list of participants and organization is attached as Annex II to this report.

5. In examining the list of participants, it is clear that there were 56 local participants (which included local donors) 21 foreign donors and 5 countries in the East and Southern African sub-region. In general, the conference appeared to have been reasonably represented by donors.

6. In consultation with the UNDP office in Kampala the mission was requested to provide a brief statement on its role in the ISAE activities since the formation of the Institute. This was followed by the statement from the UNDP which enumerated its involvement in statistics related projects in Uganda.

7. A summary of the sessions of the donors conference is provided as Annex III to this report.

8. The mission represented the UN Statistical Office at the Donors' Conference. On behalf of the UN Statistical Office, the mission made a statement at the conference. In the statement, ISAE was complemented for taking the initiative to convene the Donors' Conference and that the UN Statistical Office holds interest in all aspect of the Institute's operations. Mention was made of the UN Statistical Office interest to promote the Household Survey training programme at ISAE, the provision of the technical reports arising from technical studies undertaken by the UN Statistical Office which may assist in some of the training aspects of ISAE and the link of UN Statistical Office activities with those of the ECA under the Statistical Development Programme for Africa (SDPA) project.

9. The statements made by the country participants emphasized training to solve the problems of brain drain of trained staff. The mission commented that ways of partly solving this problem are those of emphasizing in-service statistical training programmes at the country level and continuity in the middle and professional level training programmes at the regional level.

10. The Donors' Conference discussed many aspects which touch on the support needed by the Institute. Among these aspects were the establishment of close links between the Institute and the donors, use of local capacity to carry out some of the Institute's programmes, support to the establishment of a consultancy Bureau, commitment of counter-part funds from the Government of Uganda for projects which had external inputs and that budget allocations were not enough in themselves, students who leave the Institute must learn to start from the bottom in their respective jobs, etc. The conference discussed at length the support needed for the Institutes buildings covering teaching and office accommodation and the students/consultants/visiting fellows accommodation.

11. At the end of the first day of the conference, the Donors' Conference participants were invited to visit the ISAE premises to enable them see for themselves the accommodation of the Institute and other facilities which are in place.

12. The Donors' Conference succeed in getting assurances from some of the donors of the continued support in the area of provision of experts/consultants, fellowships for trainers and trainees, provision of equipment such as micro-computers, photocopy machines, etc., supply of scholastic materials in the form of books, visual aids, etc. The big problem which remained was the support for the buildings. Later in the 14th Advisory Council Meeting, the EEC expressed interest to support the buildings and that further discussions would take place between ISAE, Ministry of Planning, and the EEC.

III. The 14th Advisory Council Meeting

13. The 14th Advisory Council Meeting was held in the Council room of the Makerere University, on 27 April 1990. The meeting was chaired by the Vice-Chancellor of Makerere University. The agenda for the meeting is attached as Annex IV and the list of attendants as Annex V.

14. It should be recalled that ECA is an ex-officio member of the Advisory Council of ISAE and the Chief of the Statistics Division is usually invited to meetings of the Advisory Council. The UN Statistical Office is also an ex-officio member of the Advisory Council of ISAE. The mission was requested to, in addition to representing ECA, also represent the UN Statistical Office.

15. Below are the highlights of some aspects of the meeting:

- (a) EEC assistance to ISAE: Mention was made of an EEC mission to the Institute in June 1990 to discuss their assistance. The Director of ISAE was requested to be in close contact with the EEC Representative in Kampala. The EEC expressed interest to support the buildings intended to be constructed for the Institute. Mention was however made of the need for Government of Uganda commitment to pay its counterpart contribution when time comes. The matter was to be discussed in detail later. Regarding the supply of micro-computers the representative of the EEC said that he had no information from the EEC in Luxembourg. On EEC assistance in general, it was mentioned that priority is now being given in the fields of agriculture or trade statistics hence to countries may have to bear this in mind.
- (b) Entry Qualifications at ISAE: Regarding students who graduate at EASTC, mention was made that the entry rules to ISAE (second year) should not discriminate Ugandan students.
- (c) Fellowships: The CFTC representative mentioned that requests for fellowships in the field of statistics were not being received, implying that countries had not made those requests. In connection with this, mention was made of the idea of a block grant to the Institute or fellowships. The CFTC was requested to reconsider this idea. Regarding the fellowships from the PTA countries, the Director of ISAE was requested to investigate the use of UAPTA (PTA currency). Some discussions took place regarding inter-university fellowships particularly those established in the three East African countries. It was mentioned that these are usually provided to fresh entrants into the university system, i.e. those with A levels. Mention was made by the Ministry of Planning representative

that there are fellowship funds under the multi-annual training programme. The Director of ISAE and the Academic Registrar were asked to contact the Ministry and see how they could use these fellowships. (Twenty fellowships were available this year.)

- (d) Project document and related issues: Uganda, Zambia and Tanzania were expected to sign soon. Project performance allowances are now being paid.
- (e) Institute brochure: This has been produced and disseminated.
- (f) Institute fees: Reduced fees were presented to council and were approved for submission to the senate of the university.
- (g) Masters degree programme: The advisory council recommended to the Director of ISAE to shorten the time of the programme and to also study what others are doing in programmes similar to this. The semester programme could also be considered in this area including the possibility of using national experts as lectures.
- (h) ISAE work programme: The Director of ISAE was requested to work out a priority of workshops and seminars and include those likely to be financed and/or those already with financial provision.
- (i) Micro-computers: Two micro-computers were ordered under the UNFPA budget at ISAE.
- (j) Statistical Development Programme for Africa (SDPA) Project evaluation mission: Mention was made that this evaluation mission would start its work in Addis Ababa in late May 1990 and finish in June. This mission was expected to visit selected STPA centres to discuss issues related to the assistance of the project. The Director of ISAE was requested to get prepared in case his centre was chosen to be visited for this evaluation exercise.
- (k) Date and venue of next meeting: Following an offer by the representative of the government of Zambia that his government was willing to host the next meeting of council, council gladly accepted to hold the next meeting in Lusaka, Zambia on 24 April 1991.

IV. Conclusions and Recommendations

16. The mission to Uganda achieved two things: the attendance at the Donors' conference and the participation at the 14th Advisory Council Meeting. The two meetings achieved great success in stimulating discussions on issues which are important in the successful development of the Institute. The Advisory Council Meeting was timely in ensuring that the majority of countries which are members of the Advisory Council were represented.

17. Regarding the Donors' Conference, it is recommended that for future conferences of this nature the Director of ISAE should obtain commitment of some donors to undertake certain activities before the conference to avoid them hesitating to make a statement of their intentions. Through this approach other donors would feel encouraged and bravely pledge their commitment or support financially or otherwise.

18. The Institute should actively pursue the interest which the EEC has shown in the buildings proposed to be put up at the Institute. If need be other donors should continue to be explored to avoid a heavy load on one donor.

19. Finally, the full reports of both the Donors' Conference and the 14th Advisory Council Meeting will be produced by ISAE in due course.

SUMMARY OF SESSIONS OF DONORS' CONFERENCE AT UGANDA INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE CENTER, 25 - 26 APRIL 1990

1. OPENING CEREMONY: 25 April 1990, 9.40 - 11.00 a.m.

CHAIRMAN: Hon. Mathew Rukikaire, Minister of State for Planning and Economic Development.

The conference was called to order at 9.40 a.m. by the Chairman, the Hon. Mathew Rukikaire, Minister of State for Planning and Economic Development who after the opening remarks, called upon the Director of ISAE, the UNECA representative, the UNDP representative and the Vice-Chancellor of Makerere University to make their respective statements, in the same order.

1. Dr. J.P.M. Ntozi, the Director of ISAE welcomed participants and delegates and introduced them. He then traced the origin of the Donors' conference to the 13th meeting of the Advisory Council in Harare, Zimbabwe, where it was decided to hold a Donors' Conference in Kampala in November 1989, a date that was latter postponed to 25 - 26 April 1990. The Director outlined the history, objectives, programs, organization and achievements of ISAE, thanked participating countries and praised the Government of Uganda, Makerere University and donor agencies for their continued support.

2. The UNECA representative, Mr. E.F. Ching'anda, recounted UNECA's role in the development of ISAE since 1966 and listed areas in which UNECA has provided assistance to ISAE. Mr. Ching'anda indicated that UNECA would continue to provide assistance to ISAE on similar lines to what has been done so far.

3. The Assistant Resident Representative of UNDP, Kampala, concurred with the objectives of the Institute as presented in the donors' documents, enumerated UNDP involvement in statistics-related projects in Uganda and agreed to the need for the provision of more training to further the objectives of ISAE.

4. The Vice-Chancellor traced the need for setting priorities, emphasised the importance of both technical and capital assistance and listed the Institute's current needs in the training of the trainers, in housing and accommodation and the creation of a home for the Institute.

5. The Chairman welcomed the delegates and guests, expressed his hope for a generous response from donors, introduced the First Deputy Prime Minister and invited him to take the floor. The First Deputy Prime Minister then welcomed participants, and underscored the role of ISAE'S graduates in social and economic development, paid tribute to ISAW and thanked all countries participating in ISAE'S programs. He also enumerated the benefits of the regional co-operation, thanked those agencies which had given assistance to ISAE, outlined the pressing needs of ISAE and urged local organizations to contribute towards the satisfaction of these needs. He closed by thanking various organizations for their assistance in convening the Donors' Conference and by expressing his wish for successful and fruitful deliberations. The Director of Planning of Makerere University then moved a vote of thanks to the First Deputy Prime Minister and also reported that Makerere University had set up desks to mobilize donors and alumni to support university programs.

The Opening session closed shortly before 11.00 a.m.

II. SESSION I: 25 April, 11.15 a.m. - 1.00 p.m.

Chairman: The Hon. Minister of State of Education.

The UNFPA Country Director, the UNECA Consultant and the Director of ISAE were the speakers in this session.

1. The UNFPA Country Director was the first speaker since he had to leave the country in two hours. He recalled UNFPA's past and present assistance to ISAE and re-affirmed its continuation with a view towards the creation of a population development study centre. UNFPA would not be involved in providing finance for construction.

2. The UNECA consultant, Prof. Ayenew Ejigou, started the presentation of the Donors' Document by recalling the history and objectives of ISAE. He then explained its organization, developments in its programs, achievements to-date and its current position with regard to academic staff and physical, teaching and research facilities. He also pointed out the generous support of a number of International organisations and went on to identify areas that still required more external assistance and support. Such assistance was needed:

- in the erection of the STATISTICS BUILDING;
- in the training of trainers;
- in the provision of fellowships for foreign students that wished to study at ISAE;
- in the provision of better facilities for computing, library and field research and for instruction; and
- in building a stronger capability for organizing more workshops, seminars and short-term courses for the region.

The Consultant then examined the future of ISAE and its needs with respect to a "HOME" of its own, and related residential building for international staff and students, the demand for statistical professional manpower in the region and the desired level of local and foreign student admissions to meet such demand. He also explained the level and volume of training of academic staff and the rationale for the same in terms of demand for effective regional services. He continued his presentation by reviewing the detailed assessment done regarding the Institute's services and by recommending the creation of two statistical laboratories, each based on a PC-Network. The justification for the choice of PCs rather than a main-frame was also explained. The Consultant also discussed the problem with regard to books, journals and computing software and pointed out recommendations related thereto in the interest of strengthening ISAE's regional professional programs. The Consultant then concluded by itemizing the Institute's vehicle and equipment needs and by giving a summary of the estimates of desired external inputs and local contributions required for the period, 1991-2000.

3. Dr. J.P.M. Ntozi, the Director of ISAE, briefed the delegates on the activities of ISAE and noted that there were 45 students in ISAE's graduate programs. He pointed out the lack of funds for organising regional short-term courses and workshops and pointed to the research record of ISAE as indicated in the Donors' Document. The Director also stressed the need for external funds to match those allocated by the Uganda Government. In the discussions that followed, the Vice-Chancellor observed that the University would appreciate both financial and technical assistance as well as ideas on how ISAE can fulfil its goals. The CFTC representative informed the meeting that CFTC would assist in manpower development and that it would continue fellowships for foreign students. In addition CFTC would continue its technical assistance. The Director of ISAE gave a clarification to a question on the annex building. The UNECA consultant welcomed the CFTC contribution and hoped for more reactions from donor agencies. He also re-emphasized the absolute necessity of putting up the STATISTICS BUILDING.

The session closed at 1.00 p.m.

III. SESSION 2: 25 APRIL 1990: 2.30 - 3.30 p.m.

Chairman: Hon. Minister of State for Planning and Economic Development

Following the Minister's opening remarks, donors' representatives were invited to present their statements.

1. The Australian representative noted that there were some scholarships for Ugandans and that he would explore possibilities for funding southern African students to study at ISAE. With regards to questions of twinning with Australian universities, he pointed that such collaboration needed further investigation.
2. The CFTC representative said that his organization was prepared to respond positively to requests for fellowships, for short-term post-graduate and post-doctoral training and for extensions for technical personnel already at ISAE. The block fund scheme, which was raised in earlier discussion, was considered acceptable to CFTC if it were ISAE's preferences.
3. The World Vision representative expressed interest in collaborating with ISAE in research, evaluation and monitoring of some of their programs in Uganda.
4. Mr. E.F. Ching'anda spoke on behalf of UNSO to complement ISAE for organizing the conference and to emphasize its interest in the setting up of a course on household surveys at ISAE. In addition, UN Statistical Office was reported to be willing to give its technical reports and to respond favourably, depending on availability of resources, to requests for consultancy services. Further assistance, however, would have to await an up-coming review and evaluation mission of the Statistical Development Programme for Africa project in May 1990. The Director was advised to prepare in advance so as to present ISAE's needs for fellowships, short-term consultants, technical experts, etc. to that mission when it visits ISAE. After the end of the session at 4.00 p.m., participants visited ISAE premises.

IV. SESSION 3: 26 APRIL 1990: 9.30 - 10.30 a.m.

Chairman: Deputy Governor of Uganda

The speakers were the Executive General Manager of UCB, the Chairman of the Katatumba Group of Companies, the Representative of the Co-operative Bank and the Chairman, himself, on behalf of the Bank of Uganda.

1. The Executive General Manager of UCB recalled the role of the local Donors' Committee and UCB's own contributions in financing a Chair of Banking at Makerere University and urged the University to encourage gifts in the form of endowments for special chairs or programs. He also supported the establishment of the University's Consultancy Bureau.
2. The Chairman of the Katatumba Group promised loans for furniture, special discounts and advised the University to emphasize on-the-job training. The Chairman also promised to contribute towards the cost of a room in the STATISTICS BUILDING should it be necessary to put it up on a joint-venture basis.

3. The representative of the Co-operative Bank also expressed his support for a Chair in an area related to banking, encouraged the development of local business software and short-term courses on the same, and promised local cover for the acquisition of certain equipment for ISAE. The CFTC representative advised that a local core group be set up to look into areas of software development useful in local business.

4. The Chairman, speaking on behalf of the Bank of Uganda, urged the University to market itself effectively in such areas as short-term courses and consultancy services. He also pointed out that the Bank of Uganda may arrange foreign purchases if contributions can be mobilized in local currency.

V. SESSION 4: 26 APRIL 1990: 11.30 - 1.00 p.m.

Chairman: Acting Chief Government Statistician (ACGS)

The ACGS gave a brief history of Statistical Services in Uganda and its present position and aspirations. He then invited participating countries to make their statements.

1. The Zambian representative observed that Zambia used ISAE for training its professionals and thanked those donors who had indicated prospects for assistance.

2. The representative from Malawi indicated that most of their training was done in U.K. and USA, but he planned to recommend ISAE for future training of statistics professionals.

3. The Tanzanian representative confirmed that Tanzania was a regular user of ISAE and noted that participation had gone down on account of foreign exchange problems and lack of student sponsorship. He urged donors to provide fellowships to those in service.

4. The representative of Swaziland noted that his country's last student to ISAE came in 1978. They have since been trained in UK and other overseas countries. He indicated that he would try to send students to ISAE instead.

5. The Director of the East African Statistical Centre (EASTC) recalled the history and the complementary objectives of EASTC and ISAE. He hoped the Institute would arrange a smooth flow of EASTC's graduates into the programs at ISAE.

6. Other speakers that expressed support for, and appreciation for, ISAE included the representatives of Zimbabwe and Lesotho. In the discussion that followed, Prof. S. Tulya-Muhika suggested that the next Advisory Council Meeting addresses the problem of lack of foreign exchange for fellowships through the use of PTA currency. To solve the common problem of brain-drain and mobility of professionals in the region, and elsewhere, Mr. Ching'anda suggested that use of in-service training be emphasized, as is currently being done in Dar es Salaam and other countries.

VI. SESSION 5: 26 APRIL 1990: 2.30 - 3.30 p.m.

Chairman: Prof. Sam Tulya-Muhika

The speakers at this session included the Representatives of Statistics Sweden, World Bank and the Director of ISAE.

1. The Representative of Statistics Sweden indicated possible areas of support as:

- (i) development of statistical infrastructure;
- (ii) statistics production, and
- (iii) strengthening regional training in the form of in-house training, short-term courses, etc.

With regard to specific assistance to ISAE, he advised that SIDA be approached for contributions towards the erection of the STATISTICS BUILDING, which he considered very important. He volunteered to carry out informal discussions with SIDA on ISAE's behalf. He also expressed the intention of his organization to participate in the build up of ISAE's facilities to promote its own regional objectives.

2. The World Bank representative urged the University to establish consultancy services which can also be fruitfully employed by the Bank. The Bank's direct support would be through financing research on the program to alleviate poverty and social cost of adjustment (SDA). He also made suggestions that might possibly enhance a donor's increased participation in ISAE's programmes.

3. The FAO representative said that FAO could sponsor lecturers in agricultural statistics and it could also provide assistance in the development of agricultural statistics. The modality for such co-operation would have to be discussed with ISAE.

4. Finally, the Director of ISAE acknowledged support from IDRC, USAID, Rockefeller Foundation, ODA, UNESCO, and ISI and thanked all participants and delegates.

The session ended at 4.00 p.m.

VII. CLOSING CEREMONY

Chairman: Vice-Chancellor of Makerere University

Chief Guest: Hon. Minister of State for Higher Education

The Vice-Chancellor summarised the outcome of the conference and invited the Minister to make the closing speech. The Hon. Minister then thanked donors, organisers, participants and Makerere University and the conference was then officially closed at 4.00 p.m.
